From the Board

The grading work for the parking lot expansion has begun, and we expect to complete the project this spring. Two bids were received for the grading. Lisa Ryan, from our congregation, offered the best bid for this work. Her \$16,000 bid was more than 25% less than the other bid, so please thank her for agreeing to do the work for much less than we budgeted. The contractor for the concrete work has not been selected, but the two bids we have received are very close to our budget estimates. At this point our budget looks good.

Not all of our neighbors are happy to see us expand our parking. We need to recognize that they enjoyed having an unimproved natural area next to their backyards for many years. Nevertheless, we want to be good neighbors. Please do everything you can to be cooperative and friendly with the folks who share our common border. If you do have any problems, please be polite and respectful. Let someone know in the office, and we will try to work out a mutually acceptable solution.

We encourage you to consider car pooling or parking at the Freedlander Park or Wooster High School until our new spaces become available.

Social Action in Action

BRING YOUR OLD EYGLASSES TO THE UUFWC - a new program, GIFT OF SIGHT will begin in February, coordinated by Karen McCoy. The Gift of Sight Foundation works in partnership with Lions Clubs International and local charities to provide free eye care and glasses to more than four million people around the world. Place your discarded eyeglasses in the labeled box on the Social Action table in the rear of the meeting room. This is an easy way to reduce clutter and help others.

ALUMINUM CANS EARN MONEY: Your contributions of aluminum cans totaled 328 pounds in 2008. Seven pounds of aluminum foil was also donated. Their recycling earned \$195.72 which was donated to Quest for Peace for the purchase of school supplies in Nicaragua. Keep drinking pop (and beer) and saving the cans. Joe Kufchak parks his dark blue pickup truck near the front of the church on the first Sunday of the month where you can leave the cans in the back. At other times, they can be left behind the green shed on the driveway.

WE'VE DOUBLED OUR MONEY: \$1000 of the grant to the Social Action Committee was used to invest in a one year Oikocredit Global Community Note to provide loans to working poor women in India. The Social Action Committee was delighted to learn that the UUA matched this with the purchase of another \$1000 note.

FOUR BEDROOMS FURNISHED: Casa Hogar, the shelter for battered women under construction by CAMO (Central American Medical Outreach) in Honduras now has four rooms of bedroom furniture thanks to the UUFWC. A \$500 donation was made from the Social Action Committee grant, Sue Gross, dressed in hard hat and overalls, raised \$648 from the congregation and an anonymous donor matched both of those amounts for a total donation to the project of \$2,296.

PEOPLE TO PEOPLE COLLECTION: February 15th is Paper and Toiletries Collection Sunday. Donations of hand soap, toilet paper, tissues, sanitary napkins, disposable diapers are needed. No paper towels, please. Put donations in the labeled bin in the rear of the meeting room. Financial donations are also welcome and can be put in the labeled jar on the table in the rear. Make checks payable to People to People.

FRIENDSHIP MEALS is a project which supplies a free super every Thursday to all who come to the New Hope Christian Center. Supported by United Way and area churches, this meals program has been helping Orrville residents for years. Their particular fund-raising event is "Time for change," where they ask members of area churches to contribute pocket change (and paper also) to support this program. This year, **March 8** is the beginning of Daylight Savings Time, and the Social Action Committee will ask for you gifts of pocket change to support Friendship Meals.

Then I have one more class, another year of internship and hopefully graduation in June 2010!

Again, I thank you for the privilege in allowing me to be involved in this caring, creative and understanding community.
