## ***From the Board***

At the January Board meeting, we discussed the selling policy from the December meeting. Some tweaking became necessary when we realized that some selling is necessary to support our Social Outreach programs. It was also brought to our attention that, as we grow, we have an increase number of children/teens participating in fundraisers for various local organizations. This creates a bit of a dilemma for folks who do not want to be approached for multiple reasons: economic situation, health issues, and simply wanting a church experience free from solicitations. Therefore, the Board has written the following policy regarding sales at the UUFWC:

"There should be no selling on the church property unless related directly to a fundraiser that only benefits the church and its social outreach programs."

An example of acceptable selling is the Equal Exchange Coffee program handled by Sue Gross. This is directly sponsored by the Social Action Committee, plus there is no one approaching members. It is in the lobby for those who are interested. We realize that some may feel they should be able to sell to their church family and we agree. We just ask that you (and your children) do not do so AT the Fellowship. Thank you and remember that our Board meetings are held on the first Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m.

When you think about adding a second service on Sunday mornings do you have some concerns? Come and explore your thoughts and feelings about having a second Sunday Service with me in one of several small group discussions. Come join here on Sunday March 8 or 15 at noon in the EEE room with a light lunch provided. Another class will be offered on Wednesday evening March 11 at 7 pm. I look forward to working with you and hearing all of your comments about this proposed change.

## ***Social Action in Action***

**DAY OF CHANGE - on March 8<sup>th</sup>**, the beginning of Daylight Savings Time, the annual collection of pocket change for Friendship Meals, a free weekly meal program in Orrville, supported by United Way and area churches, will be held. Please put your spare change in the soup kettle on the table in the foyer to support this needed program.

**GIFT OF SIGHT** is off to a good start. This new project which collects old eyeglasses for recycling to those in need has started off with many donations. Keep the program in mind when you have eyeglasses you no longer need. The box for them is on the Social Action table.

**COFFEE WITHOUT A FUSS** - if you enjoy making coffee for after the service, but don't like to deal with setting up refreshments, volunteer for the second Sunday of the month. The Social Action Committee has suggested that we limit that refreshments after the service on that Sunday to coffee only to bring awareness to those struggling due to the current economic conditions.

**PEOPLE TO PEOPLE COLLECTION** - Thanks to the STARS RE class for the great poster advertising the February collection. Watch for another clever poster for the March 15<sup>th</sup> collection which will appear on March 8<sup>th</sup>, the Sunday we limit refreshments during coffee hour to coffee only. **March 15<sup>th</sup>** is Macaroni and Cheese Collection Sunday. Please put donations in the labeled bin in the rear of the meeting room. Financial donations are also welcome and can be put in the labeled jar on the table in the rear. Make checks payable to People to People.

**NEVER SPEND A PENNY** - the tall slender jar, usually found on the Social Action table is the place for your pennies. They'll be split between the UUFWC Emergency Fund and the Social Action Committee. The collection of pennies for January added up to \$59.50. Imagine how many pennies can be collected in twelve months!

## ***The Minister's Column***

It is March, and Black History month is over...or is it? Whether or not you agree with the ideas and actions of Barak Obama as an individual, there is no denying that having an African American in the oval office will change things. En route home from Chicago in January, I observed an African American service man smile at his teasing friends and say, "There's a black man in the White House...you can't be treating me like that any more!" He was smiling and I hope it was, indeed, a friendly conversation.

The New York Post cartoon linking a chimp with the writing of the US "Stimulus Package" is another story. The cartoonist did not put the president's name on the chimp, but the parallel to old and lethal stereotypes is all too apparent. Old prejudices lie too close to the surface. African Americans have been linked to the animal which is one step behind in evolution and—because of the recent shooting of a domesticated chimp "gone wild"—the cartoon is inexcusable. The incident has created much needed conversation; even our new Attorney General Eric Holder, has weighed in on the cowardice of our population in dealing with the cancer of racism.

It will not be possible to avoid race in our conversations over the next few years...or ever again. Too often the liberal middle class—usually white—has avoided the topic, or hidden behind platitudes; we can no longer avoid the hard work of honest discussion. No longer can we point to martyrs of our faith, like UU Freedom Rider James Reeb.. It is now our turn. The next few years will uncover hidden prejudices in each of us. Together in this struggle, let's not use this opportunity as an excuse to feel better than others; let's use it as an opportunity to challenge one another to accept where we are and start again anew.

## ***Director of Religious Exploration Column***

February was quite the Social Action month! I heard that you and your children raised over \$600 for The Great American Bake Sale. The poster made by the STARS helped generate a large number of items donated on People to People Sunday. Thanks to all.

The R.E. Committee meetings are still full of enthusiasm from the coordinators of the Nursery and the four classes! Both the STARS and the Triple Es are steeped in peace and social justice curricula. The Earth Spirits and the Blessed Bees continue with Spirit Play. Nancy Hurt and Susan Heady are the primary producers of the story baskets—a huge undertaking! Each week a new story basket is introduced. Most of these 3-dimensional stories illustrate one of our UU Principles, which for the children are termed "Promises." We are willing to wager that these kids will know the Principles better than most adults!

An OWL class for first and second graders is slated to get underway at the beginning of March. This is a sexuality class entitled "Our Whole Lives." Parents attend along with their children. The nine-session program will be led by Mady Noble and me.

There will be a Social Action CON March 13-15 at the UU Church of North Hills in Pittsburgh. This is for Junior and Senior High people. 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders must have attended a CON previously. THIS IS THE BEST CON OF THE YEAR! Information will be on the website soon. That same weekend the district is holding the annual Curriculum Fair. It will be on Saturday, March 14<sup>th</sup> from 9-3 at the North Olmstead church. Our very own Nancy Hurt will be presenting on Spirit Play!

## ***News from the committees***

### ***Got Questions about Nurturing the UU Zone?***

By the time you read this, you should have received your mailing from the Stewardship Committee explaining a bit about pledging and requesting your financial commitment for the coming fiscal year. And, you may feel you are truly in the twilight zone. We want to help you find your way out. Additional information, including commonly asked questions and budget details, are on the UUFWC website ([www.uufwc.org](http://www.uufwc.org)) and beside the "reaching our goal" chart at the Fellowship.

Developing the budget involves every committee in the Fellowship. They discuss their goals and needs for the coming year, considering current needs, growth projections, and our mission. The proposed budget of \$194,602 for 2009-10 reflects their priorities and aspirations; it is also in keeping with other fellowships of our size and growth. Although we do receive income from fundraisers and open plate collection, pledges account for the largest portion of our income. The pledge amount needed to meet next year's proposed budget is \$169,202, an increase of 5% from last year's request.

We realize that many of us are living in an economic twilight zone and are concerned with making a commitment at this time; it's a concern of the Fellowship, as well. We understand if you are not able to meet your pledge as intended, but your pledge is essential for nurturing our Fellowship and planning how our Fellowship will operate so it can continue to be a vital part of our lives and the greater community. Know that your pledge and payments toward your pledge are always confidential.
