Social Action in Action

In this hard economy there are increasingly more requests for funds by organizations which help the growing number of those who are less fortunate. What to do when we our own resources are shrinking? The Social Action Committee sponsors several programs that benefit local, national and international projects at no cost.

THESE PROJECTS COST NOTHING!:

"Our Family" label collection. Labels from Buehler's house brand are donated to Every Woman's House and the Viola Startzman Free Clinic. \$25 is earned for each bundle of 500 labels. Put your labels in the basket on the Connections Table.

Quest for Peace aluminum can collection. Cans are recycled to earn funds for the purchase of school supplies for children in Nicaragua. They are collected the first Sunday of the month or can be left behind the green shed on the driveway at any time.

Travelers' Toiletries collection. Soap, shampoos and conditioner from motels and hotels are donated to the Salvation Army and Every Woman's House shelters. Put your toiletries in the labeled bin under the Social Action table in the back of the meeting room.

Gift of Sight Foundation eyeglass collection. This organization works in partnership with Lions Clubs International to provide free eye care and glasses to more than four million people around the world. Place your discarded eyeglasses in the labeled box on the Social Action table in the back of the meeting room.

Inkjet Printer Cartridge and Cell Phone Recycling. Funds received help support UFWC programs. *We will now accept any cell phone or any inkjet printer cartridge*, though we discourage those that do not have print heads--like some Canons that are ink reservoirs only. If we cannot recycle it, we will dispose of it. We can recycle used PDA's, as well (Personal Digital Assistant, like a Blackberry or Palm Pilot)--if we cannot get \$ for it, we'll send it to local electronics recycling. Leave your used cartridge, cell phone or PDA in the box on the Social Action table in the back of the meeting room. Questions? Talk to Helen Ostermiller. Day of Change collection. The Social Action Committee would like to thank all those who contributed to the "Day of Change" collection for Friendship Meals in Orrville. We collected **\$132.78** on the day we changed to Daylight Savings Time. From the 'never spend a penny' jar will add enough make this donation an even \$150.00.

The Minister's Column

We did it! About 33 people met and discussed having a second Sunday service. We had some lively discussions and it was good for me to hear all your ideas. Generally, the majority of people agreed we need to add another service in order to alleviate the crowding most of us are feeling.

Most people agreed:

- we should start the second service in September of 09 and trial it for the entire church year;
- we need an evaluation of the second service at 6 months or 9 months in order to determine if having the second service has been effective;
- during the summer months we will offer one service;
- the first service would start around 9 AM and the 2nd service around 11;
- nursery should be available at both services;
- social/coffee hour should be between the two services,

There was much discussion about how and what to offer for Religious Exploration, parking and the increased time demands on the staff. Also, there was no consensus about if the two services should be the same or different.

We need to gather the information about what the choir wants and what current RE teachers are thinking about RE with two services offered.

The plan is for me to review the results with Elaine and the board and determine what our next steps will be. Someone suggested we come up with three formats for the second service and let people look them over and see what seems to fit best.

I'll keep you posted as we move forward in the process. Thanks you for your participation and willingness to discuss the issues. It was a pleasure working with all of you on this important issue.

Hooray for the OME!

Once a year our Ohio Meadville District gives three awards for service. **Our Ohioans for Marriage Equality was recognized this year as the Faith in Action winner.** Beginning in May of 2004, this group of UUs gathered to educate the community in the wake of Ohio's vote on a constitutional amendment against gay marriage/partnership. The initiative passed, but Ohioans For Marriage Equality [OME] is still going strong. In 2005 they began speaking in local congregations and added their name to the Guest in Your Pulpit resource list; they have presented in eight congregations since that time, seeking to educate people about the lack of parity justice for gay couples who cannot marry. In 2007 they designed a public display [complete with two grooms, two brides and one straight couple wedding cake!] at the local library; a public furor started which brought protests and the Cleveland television news cameras to Wooster. They continued that venue this year. OME is also a force for coalition building: they host programs such as speakers from Lambda Legal Defense Fund and Equality Ohio, work closely with PFLAG, the high school's Gay-Straight Alliance, and the College of Wooster's Allies and Queers group. Twice a year they invite the public to a movie night, showing films such as "Lesbian Grandmothers from Mars." No discriminatory law is safe while OME is around.
