The Minister's Column- Living on the Balls of Our Feet.

Spiritual practice isn't easy. It is a balancing act between the questions, "How am I changing the world?" and "How am I caring for myself?" Many of us came to the UUFWC because we wanted to care for our children's spirits; we wanted them to see a broader vision than the limited religious view so alive in our culture. Many of us stayed on after the children had grown: we had begun to feel at home and had been stretched by Unitarian Universalism's tradition: bringing reason to religion and actively working for justice in the world. We can't do either one alone: social action work alone burns us out long before lasting change has been wrought. And an inward focus without action stymies our development. Spiritually is about give and take in balance. Mark Ewert, our UUA consultant, talked about the expectations of membership in his congregation, All Souls in Washington DC. People are asked to be present in the community on Sunday as often as possible, to be pro-active about both making sure the congregation meets their needs and offering their service to the congregation in return. The final quest is this: Are we changing the world? It is living on the balls of our feet: relaxed enough to be attentive, at ease enough to keep our muscles limber, but always ready to move. Balance. Discipline. Spirituality.

From the Board

The Board members would like to introduce themselves to the congregation in this rather informal way:

Phil Grimm - I retired a few years ago after a long and diverse career in education, which included teaching science at Wooster High School, working in the agronomy department at the OARDC, and taking care of computers for Orrville City Schools. Tim Breiner - I have been a friend of the UUFWC for about 15 years but only recently signed the book and became a member. I am a recovering Catholic and grew up in a large family in Cleveland. I have a strong interest in improving health through physical activity and work in the cardiac rehabilitation program at Wooster Community Hospital. I stay in shape by cycling and running, both of which get me outdoors year round. I am lucky to be blessed with good health and a wonderful family.

Georgia Jaeb - On the first day of kindergarten, I told my mother that I would grow up to be a teacher. I never wavered from that goal, and have been trying to teach people ever since. I teach 5th grade and love my job. I have 3 children, Annie, Ali, and Zak to teach through their lives. I'm still trying to teach husband, Michael, a thing or two. And every day, I learn something new.

Lois Grant - My initial visit to the UUFWC eighteen years ago was precipitated by my daughter Emma's desire to go to Sunday School. Director of Religious Exploration Column

We are off and running! September found us installing our Assistant DRE, Nancy Hurt. We also spent a session doing Social Action (making greeting cards).

I am told that one thing is still not clear with our two services Religious Exploration:

During the 9:00 service there is **an RE class for all ages.**

During the 10:45 service there are four RE classes divided by age levels.

So, if your family decides to attend the 9:00 service, there is a class for your children. Or, if your family comes to the 10:45 service, there is also a class for your children. Some people like to get up early, while others prefer to sleep in a bit. Now you have **a choice** for your children's religious education.
