From the Board

The committees and your Board are working on five year plans for the UFWC. One of the purposes of the five year plan is to have a goal and a way to meet the goal that moves the congregation and/or committee in a continuing or a new direction. For instance, one of the proposed goals for the music committee is to provide more music during the summer. Each goal is supported by an action plan or steps; an identification of key players needed; a time frame; and desired outcome/evaluation methods. The five year plan provides direction. Whether you serve on a committee or not, if you have an idea or a goal that you would like to see a committee or the Board address, please contact the appropriate committee chair, or if it relates to a Board action, any Board member. This is an important process and your input is needed.

Other business that requires all of our attention is an evaluation of the two services and the coffee hour. The evaluation of the worship is soon to begin. Please let your thoughts be known.

On the weekend of January 29, 2010, Elaine Strawn, Anne Wilson, Patricia Rodgers, and Bert Bishop will be attending the First Unitarian Church of Pittsburgh for a Growth and Vitality Workshop. This is the first of a series of workshops which our fellowship has committed participation. There will be seven congregations from three states meeting Friday evening and all day Saturday to discuss growth issues, problems and solutions. As this will be the first workshop, we expect to return with more information and particulars. We are hopeful that the workshop series will lend itself to participation of various members in our congregation.

On a final note, the Board firmed up contracts with John Gross and Lonnie Smith for snow removal at the fellowship. We appreciate John's willingness, in concert with Lonnie, to take on these additional responsibilities to keep the parking lots salted and cleared for safe passage. We are blessed with an active congregation that willingly donates time, talent, and resources to our fellowship.

Social Action in Action

PEOPLE TO PEOPLE: February 21st is Paper and Toiletries Sunday. Hand soap, toilet paper, tissues, sanitary napkins and disposable diapers are needed. Thanks to all who were able to contribute to the December Case Food Drive. \$1154 was collected to help restock the food pantry with frequently used items.

ADOPT-A-CLASS: 64 children attending Head Start Classes received Christmas gifts through this program. Thanks to all who were able to participate.

MICRO-FINANCE SUPPORT CONTINUES: Recently a \$1000 note purchased last year by the Social Action Committee though Oikocredit was rolled over for three years. This will enable poor women in India to establish income-generating businesses. Oikocredit currently funds 522 micro credit banks and 204 cooperatives in 71 countries, serving almost 18 million poor people around the world.

OLIVE OIL SOAP SALE was a success. The UFWC assisted Westminster Presbyterian Church in Wooster in partnership with St. George Melkite Church in Palestine in establishing a local market for this soap. Any Palestinian living in the occupied territories faces diminished living conditions. Sale of the soap provides needed income for St. George's congregation. The Social Action Committee will again sell the soap for Christmas gifts in November and December, 2010. Watch for it!

PUBLIC WITNESS LETTERS will be written on February 7th to state legislators encouraging them to adopt legislation with the most effective ban on text messaging while driving. A fact sheet will be available with the January 31st program and on the Yahoo group. Join us between the services in the Library. Sample letters, paper, envelopes and pre-printed letters will be available.

THE "DAY OF CHANGE" COLLECTION is an effort of the UFWC Social Action Committee to support Friendship Meals in Orrville, which provides a free nutritious meal to all who come on Thursday evenings throughout the year. The program is supported by United Way, individual donors and volunteers and interested congregations. We collect pocket change on the day we "change" to Daylight Savings Time, which is March 14 this year. We will have a table setting and kettle that Sunday to collect your contributions.

The Minister's Column

Poverty is evil. There is just no other word for it. News reports indicate that—due to the high cost of concrete—Haitian homes are built with concrete containing too much sand. A precarious situation becomes even worse. Poverty exponentially increases “normal” human risk: those with no extra resources are left with no resources at all: little medical care and chaotic delivery systems for food and financial aid. That is what makes the stories of Haiti’s poorest citizens even more inspiring. People who have nothing use their skills and wisdom to offer assistance to others in their former neighborhoods. The greatest hope in Haiti now seems to be devastated individuals sharing the pain and the caring...and making a difference: community at its finest.

Our Unitarian Universalist Service Committee has a tradition of using local organizations and individuals to get help where it is needed. By helping to empower those who understand the situation—because they are living it—the UUSC increases the benefit of their dollars. And they can arrive on the island without being in the way, they will go with their knowledge and human resources. It is so hard to sit and watch and feel we can do nothing in the face of this misery. Sometimes, we need to trust others to take our resources and use them to express our compassion to the world.
