The Minister's Column

Many of us attended the lecture by Dr. Eboo Patel at the College of Wooster's Academy of Religion. Dr. Patel is the organizer of the interfaith youth leadership coalition and on the President's Faith Advisory Team. He told us of the life lessons which forced him to learn the interfaith lessons within his own Muslim faith. Since then, he has been a leader in the arena of interfaith dialogue and work. Using Dr. Martin Luther King as an example, he saw the impact of people learning from the strengths of one another's faith. His challenge to us? Find the mandate for interfaith understanding within your own religious tradition. Learn about other's people's faiths, learn their ethics and their insights, and use that knowledge to become stronger and more compassionate in the practice of your own. From this foundation create peace among the peoples of the earth. Thankfully, his definition of "religion" included Humanism.

As I listened, I kept thinking, the UFWC is a perfect practice arena. Our tradition has long understood that all the world's religions contain truths and recognize common humanity. How can we use this history to create a place of welcome for such discussions? Without sounding "more enlightened" than others, how can we share what has come naturally to us? How can we a place of meeting, learning, understanding? In our little spot of the world, how to we become a place where religion means harmony and compassion rather than vindictiveness and slaughter? So many questions! Maybe we can build a dream.

From the Board

The Board is reviewing the various committees' five year plan as well as developing its' own plan for the future growth of the Fellowship. If you do not serve on a committee, but would like to provide your thoughts and concerns as to the direction or needs of the Fellowship over the next five years, please feel free to forward that information to the Board.

Steve Foskett and members of the Audit Committee have completed their audit and provided an in depth 2009 internal financial review report which is now being reviewed and acted upon by the Finance Committee, John Schaeffer, Chair. Thank you to the Audit Committee and Steve Foskett for a job well done.

Tom Robertson and Cheryl Davis will be presenting a series of seminars entitled "Leadership Development" . There are many purposes for the seminar series, and the series will be open to the membership. The seminar program will be based on the UUA **Harvest the Power; Developing Lay Leadership program**. There will be basically twelve workshops each of about two hours in duration which will be presented in a sequence or in a variety of combinations. This will be a program available to the membership so that our members can build confidence and knowledge and discover their own leadership interests and abilities. This is an exciting program that will begin very soon. Please contact Tom Robertson directly to obtain additional information and express your interest.

Mary Wicks and Tom Gross are spearheading the Stewardship campaign which is geared to training members of the Fellowship in stewardship conversation for the pledge drive. It is anticipated that a one on one pledge drive will be utilized each year beginning wth this year. The stewardship conversation is an important step to keep connected with other members and to evaluate the strengths and needs of the Fellowship.

Reverend Dr. Elaine Strawn, Anne Wilson, Bert Bishop, and Patricia Rodgers attended the UUA Planning for Growth & Vitality workshop in Pittsburgh in January. This will be a three year commitment for our fellowship with participation by members in weekend workshops every six months. Interestingly, while many faiths are experiencing a decline in membership, the UU is experiencing growth. With growth comes responsibility and effective, responsive leadership requires training. While the series is just beginning, we have a number of ideas that we will "float" to our various committees for input and action. One interesting question posed during the retreat was, "What do you want to do for your church before you die? i.e. What are our dreams?" What is your hope, your dream?

Social Action in Action

HAITI RELIEF COLLECTION: the two Sunday collections for the UUSC Haiti Relief project raised \$1744.85. Thanks to all who were able to contribute.

ELECTION RESULTS: the vote for the UUA Study/Action Issues is complete. Voters were asked to select five out of the six suggested issues. Fifty four ballots were cast although not all had votes for five issues. The winners are Energy, Peace, and Justice (49 votes); Ending Slavery (46 votes); Revitalizing American Democracy (43 votes) and National Economic Reform: A Moral Imperative (42 votes). The issue with the lowest number of votes was Nuclear Disarmament (34 votes). Thanks to all those who took the time to cast a ballot.

BIRTHDAY CAKE SUNDAY is March 7th. We look forward to welcoming you at UU Inquiry or New Member Sunday. ~Joanne Schroeder

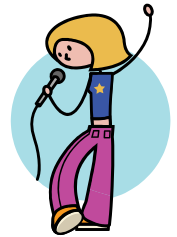
Music Committee
