The Minister's Column

It is a real joy to welcome Karen Skubik to our staff as a part-time Membership Coordinator. Kevin Lowry got us started, serving as a Volunteer Coordinator. Danni Schantz used her tenure as our Membership Coordinator to help us develop Steps Toward Membership. Karen will continue this process with her new ideas; she has already been investigating creative ideas and programs from the UUA and other congregations.

We have an ongoing conversation at the UUFWC about growth: Do we want to grow??? The workshops our leadership has attended highlight five areas of growth, only one of which is numerical. Healthy congregations grow in:

- maturity [deepening their understanding of Unitarian Universalism and our responsibility in the world];
- structure [organizing themselves into a form which makes sense and uses volunteers and staff wisely]
- denominational involvement [participating in regional and national UU programs and learning opportunities and leadership training]
- stewardship [understanding what a congregation requires to be financially healthy for the long future ahead]...and
- numbers [joyously greeting new seekers who have found their local Unitarian Universalist congregation].

All of these areas constitute growth, and any one of them ignored would bring down the walls around us. There is a world in need of our message of justice, of reason, of honoring differences. And we need a steady diet of our own message, also. Thank you for being building blocks of a just and peaceful future.

New Class Coming in January

The headlines continue to announce that we have much work to do on racism. The problem is that we are GOOD at racism; it is moving in the opposite direction which is hard. Debby Irving wrote a book in 2014, <u>Waking Up White</u>, a humble yet challenging study of what it means to be white [and what it means to be a person of color] in our society.

Our Whole Lives is a series of lifespan sexuality education curricula. OWL helps participants make informed and responsible decisions about their bodies, sexual health, and behavior. It equips participants with accurate, age – appropriate information in six subject areas: human development, relationships, personal

skills, sexual behavior, sexual health, and society and culture. Grounded in a holistic view of sexuality, OWL provides not only facts about anatomy and human development, but helps participants to clarify their values, build interpersonal skills, and understand the spiritual, emotional, and social aspects of sexuality. Transgender-themed Movie Night Friday, January 22, 7:00 pm at UUFWC

Despite the advances in acceptance of gays and lesbians, transgender people are often less well understood and accepted. Come to the UU Fellowship on Friday, January 22 at 7:00 pm for a free transgender-themed movie and discussion. Refreshments will be served.

This past November voters overwhelmingly overturned the anti-discrimination law passed by the Houston, TX City Council. The primary discussion was the "bathroom issue"—which bathroom can be used by a transgender individual.

Ohioans for Marriage Equality (OME) celebrated the recent Supreme Court decision legalizing samegender marriage throughout the US. But because LGBT people can still be fired from their jobs, denied mortgages and more; because transgender people often face both discrimination from the public and lack of acceptance by their families, OME has been welcomed back into the UUFWC Social Action Committee to continue to work for equality in our area and are sponsoring this Movie Night.

Social Action In Action

THE INHERENT WORTH AND DIGNITY OF EVERY PERSON. JUSTICE, EQUITY AND COMPASSION IN HUMAN RELATIONS. These are our first two UUA Principles which we can honor by volunteering at the **Wooster Hope Center.** Founded in 2011, the Hope Center's aim is "to foster self-confidence and embrace the inherent dignity and worth of individuals by meeting them where they area and providing the most basic of necessities". It provides food, clothing, haircuts and hygiene supplies to over 3,500 <u>different</u> families in Wayne County annually.

In addition to monthly food distributions which are supported by the Akron Canton Regional Food Bank, there is a weekly emergency food pantry, a monthly lunch, monthly hygiene products distribution, twice weekly clothing distribution, twice monthly haircuts and monthly workshops on topics such as budgeting and parenting. In addition, a monthly community dinner is offered in Fredericksburg, a food pantry was opened in October in Rittman, and the Backpack of Food is available for children in the Wooster and Rittman schools.

The Wooster Hope Center is 100% volunteer with no payroll. It is sustained through local contributions, local church collaboration, volunteers, fund-raising projects and grant funding. The current roster of community partners totals sixty four which includes churches, retail and manufacturing businesses, schools and other governmental agencies, non-profit agencies and civic organizations. The UUFWC is not on that roster. If we truly support our UU Principles we probably should be.

An average of 150+ volunteers monthly put in over 10,000 hours of volunteer time each year. We've had volunteers at the Saturday food distributions in October and November. The sessions last between 2 and 3 hours, are fast paced involving bagging food and requiring some bending and lifting. A couple of UUs in their late seventies were able to do it in November, so how hard can it be? The Social Action Committee would like to form a pool of volunteers so that no one person would have to volunteer more than three times a year. A volunteer coordinator to keep track of the monthly assignments would be most welcome. Watch for announcements and a sign-up sheet. If you have questions, see Sue Gross.

OPEN PLATE COLLECTION The January, 2016 Open Plate Collection on Sunday the 31st will go to Every Woman's House (EWH), a nonprofit agency which offers treatment services to the survivors of interpersonal violence. EWH is also dedicated to the prevention of such violence in the community at large. On the EWH website one may find the many ways in which total families are aided, from a crisis hotline, family counseling and shelter, to victim advocacy and batterer intervention Additionally, EWH provides education for community groups and for every school district in Wayne and Holmes Counties. May we continue to assist this worthy organization.
