Minister's Meditations From Rev. Walter Clark

How's your heart, friends?

This has been a rough month. We've seen two mass shootings back to back followed by decisions from the Supreme Court that expand gun rights, reduce religious liberties and strip reproductive right away from women and people with uteruses. In the background the January 6th commission continues. While reliving the horrific moments of that day many believe those who have worked to destroy democracy and freedom will never be held accountable. It feels as if the world is determined to make each week worse than the next.

It's enough to break your heart.

I got the news about the loss of reproductive freedoms while I was at UUA General Assembly (GA) in Portland, OR. The irony is that the 2015 GA was also in Portland. That year the Supreme Court made another momentous decision, the right for marriage equality. When the decision came down there was a huge celebration and they invited all of the LGBTQ+ folks to go up on the stage to celebrate. I was afraid that it was going to collapse! There were so many folks celebrating. It was a great time to be with my fellow UU's.

There are a lot of similarities between then and now. The nation's highest court made a decision that impacted a marginalized community. Emotions ran high and we UU's banded together in order to process what we were feeling. This year we wept, we shouted, and we marched. I watched as our denomination's president address an angry crowd of folks in the public square in Portland. I witnessed the GA chaplains working overtime to comfort those struggling to process this loss of dignity. And I overheard many a conversation about the ruling. I witnessed as we all took time and space to lean on each other.

One of the roles of a religious community is to gather in the broken times. To hold each other as we weep and gnash our teeth. To bear witness to each other's pain and say simply, "I hear you. I'm so sorry." Recognizing the hurt starts the healing process and paves the way for the next steps.

Action.

I know you want to do something. There will be a letter writing event on July 3rd after service to let our elected officials (no matter what party or who they are) know that we do not consent to this loss of dignity. I encourage you to not just attend service that Sunday but BRING A FRIEND! The more letters we send, the more impact we have. There will be a public witness event on July 4th for reproductive rights that I hope to see you all at. And I am sure all of this is just the beginning.

We have a lot to do, friends and we need to do it together. That is what our faith calls us to do.

Social Action in Action *Submitted by Betty Schuler, of the Social Action Committee*

SHARING WITH OTHERS The annual budget of the Social Action Committee has built into it funding for social justice agencies that is distributed in June at the end of the UUFWC fiscal year. The Social Action Committee has voted to distribute the funds as follows.

\$500 to the [Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank](#) which supports more than 5 hundred pantries, hot-meal sites, homeless shelters and other hunger relief programs. Every dollar donated provides the equivalent of four meals. Inflation has impacted local families. The food bank reports that every month in the first 4 months of 2022 has shown an increase of 5,000 people using its services.



\$254 to [World Central Kitchen](#), a non-profit providing hot meals in times of disaster. It was founded by celebrity chef Jose' Andres' in 2010 to prepare food in Haiti following a devastating earthquake. In February, 2022 with the invasion of Ukraine by Russia, World Central Kitchen set up a kitchen at a pedestrian crossing into southern Poland to feed refugees fleeing Ukraine. It has since expanded to serve millions of meals at crossings into Romania, Moldova and Hungary. It is also partnering with restaurants inside of Ukraine to get hot meals to anyone in need.

\$253 to [UNICEF USA](#), which is delivering aid to Ukrainian children. Its emergency response teams have been on the ground in Ukraine since 2014, addressing impacts of conflict on children in the eastern region. Since the Russian invasion in February, 2022 it has significantly scaled up operations all across the country. As of mid-May 7.7 million people were internally displaced and more than 6.4 million people – including nearly two thirds of all children in Ukraine have crossed into Poland, Romania, Moldova, Slovakia, Hungary and other neighboring countries. UNICEF focuses on meeting the most critical urgent needs of children for safety, health care, safe water and nutrition.

Return to the Wild

In 2006 Carastar Industries in Rittman closed. It left behind 300 acres of buildings, with collapsing roofs, ponds used for dumping water filled with paper pulp and a landfill where layers of pulp were piled so high that it is known as Mount Rittman. In 2012 Urban Renewables II took ownership of the property and began the cleanup process. In 2018 the city of Rittman received a \$2.6 million Clean Ohio grant to purchase 210 acres and turn it into a nature preserve. Mayor William Robertson, with an army of volunteers, undertook clearing paths, removing invasive species and planting trees. With additional volunteers numbering more than 100 and funding from several sources, this land has been returned to wilderness.



Named the Mayor William J. Robertson Nature Preserve in recognition of the mayor's efforts, the preserve was opened formally in June, 2022. It has 13 ponds, one as large as 20 acres with a kayak launch, 7.2 miles of walking trails, including ADA accessible trails that are 6 feet wide. 1,020 donated hardwood trees have been planted. The transformer station that powered the cardboard factory is in the process of being turned into an education center. Grants and donations received will provide chimney swift towers, bird houses and bat houses to be placed on the remaining power poles. Pollinator gardens have been started and a half acre of native plants, including native milkweed, planted. According to Audubon and eBird, 76 species of birds have been documented. A group of trumpeter swans remained all last winter. Mammals living there include deer, raccoon, skunk, coyote, red fox, meadow vole, squirrel, chipmunk, rabbit, beaver, mink and muskrat

The preserve can be reached off of Route 57. Turn on Sheets Road to Morningstar Road. There is a small parking area near the entrance and a larger one a short distance further on. It sounds worth checking out.

Osler Ortez, a newly minted CFAES (College of Food, Agricultural and Environmental Sciences) assistant professor from Nicaragua, and Jean-Pierre, a visiting scholar from Ecuador working in Osler's lab, organized the Wooster Bike Workshop super well. Thank you so much!

During the month of July, the Crew were involved in 2 events:

1. The **Wooster Bike Party**, on the 2nd Friday of every month, meeting at the UUFWC at 6:30pm, and leaving at 7pm (just like the Cleveland Critical Mass schedule). We had 2 new people, who came down from Cleveland: Lori and her granddaughter, Alex, who will be attending the College of Wooster next year as a Freshwoman. We modified our route to visit more of the College of Wooster, which included the meditation labyrinth to the east of the COW Art Center. We ended at JAFB.



2. The **Wayne Trails "Run, Walk & Roll"**, which included a Poker Run with 12 downtown businesses. The contestants would pick up a card from a deck that each business had, and they would try to build the best Poker hand. We ran into another one of our crew members: Karen Skubik, who was shopping at the Farmers Market with her husband, Casey Hoy!



If you are interested in joining the Wooster Bike Compost network (within the Wooster City limits), we would deliver to you 2 compost buckets (for which you will donate \$10, at paypal.me/WoosterBikeCompost), and then you start composting your food scraps, everything pretty much except for meats and labels, and not even for the time being, the bio-degradable plastics. Once one bucket is full, you would contact us, and a teenager or an adult from our Wooster Bike Crew will come pick it up, empty it in our compost site at the Muellner Art Park (Oakhill & Wayne, where the Biden Hill is located), and bring back the empty bucket a few days later for which again, we accept a donation, this time for \$5.

The Wooster Bike Compost also sells a potting mix, made from our compost, for \$10 bucket, but we will be having some workforce issues over the summer.
