
12/18 - Winter Solstice

Minister's Meditations Rev. Walter Clark

Christmas is the only holiday that has its own soundtrack. You can make a case that Halloween has its own songs, but nothing compares to the catalogue of Christmas music. One of the things that I love about Christmas music is that every generation and genre gets in on it. You have the golden age classics with Bing Crosby and Mel Tormé. Gene Autry introduced us to Rudolph in the early 1950's and Brenda Lee rocked us around the Christmas Tree in the late 50's. The Gen X'ers gave us Band Aid and *Do They Know It's Christmas* and Millennials gave us Mariah Carey and the incessant *All I Want For Christmas*. From pop to punk to country to rap everyone puts their own mark on Christmas music, including Unitarian Universalists.

I remember during my very first UU Christmas Eve Service, we sang Joy to the World. This has got to be one of my favorite Christmas Hymns. I remember going to the 11pm Christmas Eve service at my old Lutheran church and that being the final song. They had a trumpeter in the choir loft who would join in on the last verse and the organist pulled out all the stops (literally) and the whole sanctuary shook. So when I heard it in the UU service I joyfully took a deep breath and belted out the first line, "Joy to the world, the Lord has come!" Only to realize that I was the only one who sang those words. In the grey hymnal it states, "Joy to the world, the Word is come." (yes, Word is capitalized).

UU's have a reputation for changing the lyrics to old hymns, it's nothing new. In a way it makes sense that we would do it for Christmas Carols as well. Did you know that UU's rewrote *Silent Night* in order to be more secular?

Silent Night! Peaceful night!
All things sleep, shepherds keep
Watch on Bethlehem's silent hill
Unseen while all is still
Angels watch above
Angels watch above

I can't imagine singing that by candlelight on Christmas Eve. It just feels wrong. Yet I understand the impulse to remove certain elements. As a faith we believe in reason and the scientific process which makes it hard to sing about angels, virgin births and infant kings. But many of us still balk at these words changes and insist on singing the carols as we knew them. Why?

I firmly believe that this is the time of year where we embrace magical thinking. It is the season of "peace on earth, goodwill towards humanity." It is when we search for the best in others, even though they may have let us down before (and this is the time of year we are more likely to find it in them!) Hope is when we believe in something positive, even though we have no logical reason to do so. This is the season of hope. It's a time where we can embrace the idea behind an infant savior without needing to believe in the idea of needing to be saved.

I have no problem with us UU's leaving our mark on holiday music, but I don't think we need to erase what has come before. You'll notice that the current version of *Silent Night* in the hymnal is the one we are all familiar with. Don't be surprised if we sing the old version of *Joy to the World* either. It's all about embracing the hope and wonder of the season.

We hope you will give it a try and join us in this monthly gathering!



The two children's titles described below are new to our UUFWC library:

THE MORE YOU GIVE By Marcy Campbell

Written by the UUFWC's own Marcy Campbell, this picture book has two reinforcing storylines – one following the growth of an acorn from tree to forest and one the progression of love from generation to generation, from individual to community. Each require love and patience.

Created with digital painting tools, the illustrations (by Francesca Sanna) are vibrant in green, purple, and oranges. And the




placement of the pictures is patterned to match the repetition of word patterns. For example, a green double-page spread marks each transition from one generation to the next, with each green spread ending with the transition words "And they were happy."

A beautiful book – with text and illustrations reinforcing one another to create a whole bigger than the sum of its parts.

JUST ASK!: BE DIFFERENT, BE BRAVE, BE YOU By Sonia Sotomayor

"Sonia and her friends are planting a garden, and each one contributes in his or her own way. Rafael has asthma and sometimes has to stay calm so he can breathe better, which gives him time to paint beautiful rocks for the garden. Anthony uses a wheelchair to get around and can move super fast, directing the group. Anh has a stutter and prefers to listen, so she knows just how to plant each flower. All of the friends are different, but they all have one thing



in common: They like to ask questions and learn about each other.

In this warm and inclusive story by US Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor, inspired by her own childhood diagnosis of diabetes, readers join along as differently abled kids use their strengths to work together and learn about each other. With vibrant, engaging art by award-winning illustrator Rafael Lopez, this book shows us that differences

are wonderful – and that all you have to do when you don't understand something is JUST ASK!"


WOOSTER'S ALTERNATIVE GIFT MARKET IS BACK!

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR THE SEVERE WEATHER

SHELTER. The severe weather shelter, housed at the Wooster Salvation Army, will be opening up to anyone who needs a warm, safe space when the temperature "feels like" it has dropped below 25 degrees. Individuals or couples who are interested in volunteering are needed. Covid-19 protocols will be carried out to keep everyone healthy and safe. The Salvation Army will have a staff member in the building at all times if needed. All volunteers will need to have a completed background check in order to start at the shelter. Citizen's Climate Lobby Wooster Chapter

One of the sponsors of the two recent Power A Clean Future Ohio (PFCO) presentations was the Wooster Chapter of the Citizens' Climate Lobby (CCL). This is a non-partisan organization with members throughout the United States, Canada and other countries which advocates for effective climate legislation. Local chapters lobby their elected representatives and work through local outreach and media. Their goal is to cut greenhouse gas emissions and promote a transition to a renewable energy economy through a market-based approach: a revenue-neutral "carbon fee and dividend" approach to pricing carbon pollution from fossil fuels, and simultaneously ending subsidies to fossil fuel companies. In the United States, using a market-based approach by putting a price on carbon is gaining support from both Republicans and Democrats. CCL believes that a revenue-neutral carbon fee and dividend is a bipartisan solution that would effectively address carbon emissions without relying on a complex regulatory approach.

CCL proposes national legislation that would reduce U.S. greenhouse gas emissions by placing a fee on carbon dioxide (CO2) or equivalent gases. The fee would be levied against all fossil fuels at their point of entry into the economy. The revenues that would be collected would be 100% returned as a monthly or annual payment to every American household. This would protect low and middle class Americans from the rising consumer costs associated with the carbon fee. This is known as a carbon fee and dividend (CF&D).

CCL's proposal would start the fee at \$15 per ton of CO2 and rise \$10 per ton each year. The fee would continue to rise until total U.S. CO2 equivalent emissions have been reduced to 10% of U.S. CO2 equivalent emissions in 1990. To protect U.S. businesses from competition from other countries that do not have carbon pricing mechanisms, a border adjustment would be enacted. Goods coming from countries without a carbon price would be subjected to a fee at the border. In addition, all existing subsidies of fossil fuels, including tax credits, would be phased out over the five years following enactment of the proposed bill.
