Spring is a time of being on the edge between the cold winter and the heat of summer. What lessons can the seasons teach us about living in the space between?


Minister's Meditations

What is an installation anyway? I never really liked the term because it makes the minister seem like a major appliance. The event itself is very similar to an ordination ceremony with many of the same elements, such as a charge to the minister, a charge to the congregation and a rite of installation/ordination. Both events have speakers that are important to the minister, have an order of service similar to a regular worship service and tend to last about 90 minutes. Installation traditionally takes place within the first year of the minister's call to the congregation. It is NOT a celebration of the minister. It is instead a celebration of the shared ministry and vision between the congregation and the minister. The installation is very much about us.

While I would have liked to have had this ceremony last August, around the actual one year date on my time here, I think having it around the one year anniversary of our re-opening is a great way to mark our time together. While we found ways to create community together during the pandemic with outdoor meet-ups and Zoom meetings, over the past 12 months we have seem our attendance numbers grow on Sunday mornings, in Religious Exploration and in social gatherings. There is a stronger interest in social justice in the community and spiritual exploration and education. This is a strong, growing spiritual community.

I hope that you are able to come to the installation to celebrate your work over the past year. To enjoy all that you have accomplished and renew yourself to make the next year even better!

Committee on Ministry Submitted by John Waldman

On March 5, our community will celebrate the Installation of Reverend Walter Clark, recognizing him as the settled minister for the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Wayne County. This is an important event for both the congregation and Reverend Walter. The congregation adds a new chapter to its history, and the ceremony is a key event for Rev Walter as he achieves an important personal milestone. It also marks the start of the next phase of Reverend Walter's career development.

UU ministers pass through several points in their career. The next phase for Reverend Walter is to work towards full fellowship as a UU minister. This is an official status granted by the UUA's Ministerial Fellowship Committee (MFC). The process of attaining full fellowship is one of structured continuous learning and professional development activities. Being in full fellowship is like to being granted tenure in an academic setting. In order to be granted full fellowship, a minister in preliminary fellowship (Reverend Walter's current status), is required to have three approved annual appraisals with the MFC.

The annual appraisals include submitting documentation showing readings completed, courses taken, evidence of professional growth, Board evaluations, self and mentor assessments, and input from the congregation relating to these areas of ministerial competency:

- Worship and Rites of Passage	- Social Justice in the Square
- Pastoral Care and Presence	- Administration
- Spiritual Development for Self and Others	- Serving the Larger UU Faith
	- Leads the Faith Into the Future

The purpose of this survey and our conversations is to enhance the ministry of our congregation and to help Rev. Walter grow. As a result, we believe that the best feedback is specific, non-anonymous feedback because the ministry of the UUFWC is a shared responsibility with each of us invested in working to make improvements. This means that your name will be associated with your feedback but your feedback will only be shared with members of our committee.

Gathering the congregation's input in the assessment process is key. In order to do this work, the Board of Directors has authorized the formation of a Committee on Ministry (COM). The Committee's members are Mary Wicks, Adam Keating, Denise Bostdorff, Sarah Miles, and myself. The COM's charge is to gather "information from the congregation and other sources on the minister's standing with respect to all areas of ministerial competency."

Every congregation member and friend will have the opportunity to respond to a survey. In the coming months you will have a chance to answer several questions on the various areas of ministerial competency and offer written comments. Since we each experience Reverend Walter's ministry in different ways, having a high level of participation from our community is critical to painting an overall picture of Reverend Walter's impact.

In addition to the survey, we welcome any personal feedback you may wish to provide directly to any member of the Committee about Reverend Walter's performance in particular competency areas. Also, we will be reaching out to individuals and groups who might have insights especially relevant to a particular area, such as Administration, Pastoral Care, or Rites of Passage, for example.

More details about the survey will be provided in the coming weeks. Please feel free to direct any questions relating to the process to any Committee On Ministry team member. We appreciate your participation in this important process.

In this lesson we explore the times when life asks us to be vulnerable and show our true selves and bravely say, "This is me." In honor of Transgender Day of Visibility on March 31 we will explore all of the pieces that make us who we are and celebrate each other and our unique selves.





MISTAKES AND MIRACLES: CONGREGATIONS ON THE ROAD TO MULTICULTURALISM By Nancy Palmer Jones and Karin Lin

"What calls Unitarian Universalists to create multicultural, antiracist Beloved Community? What do

congregations need when they embark on this journey? What common threads run through their stories? Nancy Palmer Jones and Karen Lin – a white minister and a lay person of color – share how five diverse congregations encounter frustrations and disappointments, as well as hope and wonder, once they commit to the journey. Mistakes abound. Miracles of transformation and joy emerge too. Extensively researched and thoughtfully written – with reflection questions at the end of each chapter – Mistakes and Miracles: Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism will guide readers to apply these stories to their own communities, develop next steps, and renew their commitment to this hard but meaningful work."

Social Action in Action

HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS IN WAYNE COUNTY The large crowd that filled First Presbyterian Church's Bruch Hall for the second <u>Housing & Homelessness in Wayne County</u> presentation on February 9th reinforced one speaker's comment that Wayne County really cares about this issue. The program emphasized the continued need for shelter and highlighted progress that has been made. Solutions to homelessness, including permanent supportive housing were presented by OneEighty, Inc. and the Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority. Two homeless individuals spoke of how they became homeless and the struggles they have had. Opportunities to volunteer were available as well as literature about local agencies. This presentation was sponsored by Wayne County Housing Coalition, Wooster Homelessness Task Force, Wayne-Holmes Reentry Coalition and the League of Women Voters of Wayne County. A brief description of these organizations follows which may be helpful to those wishing to act in behalf of more housing opportunities.

WAYNE COUNTY HOUSING COALITION (330-264-2727) is a broad-based county-wide membership,

including consumers of housing services, minorities, political subdivisions, social service agencies and business whose purpose is to bring people together in a forum where they can advocate for and educate the community about the need for safe, decent and affordable housing for Wayne County residents. It has five standing committees: Publicity & Community Education, Faith Based Connection, Service Evaluation & Development, Policy & Government, and Healthcare & Education. <u>Its meetings are open to the public</u> and held on the third Wednesday of the month at <u>7:30 **am**</u> in the conference room at Wayne County Job & Family Services, 3565 W. North Street (back entrance off parking lot).

WOOSTER HOMELESSNESS TASK FORCE (whtfoh@gmailo.com) is a volunteer organization formed in December 2019. Its mission is to assist in creating a continuum of safe; physically, geographically and financially accessible and sustainable housing for homeless and inadequately housed low income people living in or moving through Wooster. It works closely with established agencies to address the issues impacting homeless and low income populations. It was the sole sponsor of the meeting on homelessness in February, 2022 which drew an equally large crowd. Among its activities is providing training for volunteers to mentor the unsheltered and to assist at the Severe Weather Shelter located at the Salvation Army.

WAYNE-HOLMES REENTRY COALITION (330-264-1900) provides reentry service coordination and assists individuals with release planning who are returning to Wayne and Holmes counties. Employment assistance/job readiness, reentry support groups, mentoring/peer to peer coaching and reentry community groups/coalitions are the services offered at no charge.

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF WAYNE COUNTY (<u>lwvwaynecounty.org</u>) is a non-partisan organization where hands-on work to safeguard democracy creates positive, lasting change in our communities. It is dedicated to educating citizens and helping to foster dialogue on important issues.

COALITION ON HOMELESSNESS AND HOUSING IN OHIO (COHHIO) although not a sponsor of the presentation, a representative from this organization was scheduled to speak, but was unable to do so. For those interested in making federal, state and local officials aware of the needs in the community, one of the core functions of **COHHIO** is advocating for state and federal policies to promote affordable housing and end homelessness. All Things Green

<u>NEED A RIDE IN WOOSTER OR WAYNE COUNTY?</u> A booklet by that title has been prepared by the NAACP Environmental & Climate Justice Committee and the Wooster Interfaith Justice Committee Climate Change Group (UUs serve on both committees). This project was an answer to the question *What problems do you have living in Wooster?*, asked in a survey conducted by the NAACP E&CJ Committee in the churches located south of Bowman Street in Wooster. The response most often was access to transportation. Research indicated that most information about local transportation services was found on various websites, presenting difficulties for those needing the services who may not have access and/or do not know what to look for. It was found that there are a number of services that can benefit not only low income individuals, but those who do

not have access to their own transportation or prefer to use public transportation, but can pay for the service.

The booklet covers a number of areas using the format, What is It? Who Can Ride? Where it Goes, How Much it Costs, How to Sign Up and Other Things To Know. It starts with a detailed description of the City of Wooster Transportation Program including using the Wooster Transit bus and the transportation taxi cab passes. Other services described are Wayne County Transit, free in-county transportation, medical transportation services, including Wooster Community Hospital transportation, Aultman Hospital transportation, out of county transportation and Gilcrest transportation. Included also is information about low cost transportation between Wooster and Columbus (and stops in between) on the GOBUS.

It has been distributed in Wooster to several agencies: One Eighty, People to People Ministries, Salvation Army, Viola Startzman Clinic, Wooster Hope Center, Wayne/Holmes United Way, College of Wooster, and Catholic Charities and is in the process of being distributed to Wooster churches that provide meals or other service to the general public. Second Baptist Church, Westminster Presbyterian Church, St James Episcopal Church, Trinity United Church of Christ, and St. Mary Catholic Church have already received copies.

A copy of the brochure is located in the UUFWC library in a labeled holder on the table facing the book window. It does not circulate, but can be consulted there or a copy can be made in the office.

WAYNE COUNTY TREE SEEDLING SALES: the Wayne Soil and Water Conservation District is accepting orders for its annual tree sale. This year the available species are: dawn redwood 12-18 inches, \$20; Douglas fir 18-24 inches, \$15; Norway spruce 18-24 inches, \$15 and Scotch pine 10-16 inches, \$10. The trees are available in packs of 10 trees. In addition, a nut pack, consisting of three each of hazelnut and butternut, two each of northern pecan and black walnut is available at \$30 per pack. A pollinator pack consisting of two each of red Osier dogwood, choke cherry, American plum, meadowsweet and pasture rose is \$30 per pack. The wildlife pack consists of two each of American hazelnut, American plum, ninebark, red Osier dogwood and swamp white oak at \$20 per pack. A Scotch pine seedling pack to donate to local elementary schools students is available for \$10. Marking flags are also available in bundles of 10 for \$3. Deadline for ordering packets is March 10. Tree pickup date is April 13 from noon to 4:30 pm at the Wayne County Fairgrounds in the sheep barn. Order forms are available online at <u>wayneswcd.org</u> and at the SWCD office in the lower level of the Wayne County Administration Building. Payment must be included with orders (cash or check) which will be processed on a first-come basis. For more information, call 330-263-5376.

The UUFWC is the official sponsor of the **Wooster Bike Crew**. While the Wooster Bike Crew functions under the auspices of the BSA (Boy Scouts of America), it is an inclusive Venturing Crew, welcoming all-gender youth aged 14 and above. The **Wooster Bike Crew** has two primary goals:

- It gets teens involved with volunteering in their community to build their service record.
- It teaches teens to repair, ride safely, camp with, and use bicycles daily, promoting green mobility.

The current Wooster Bike Crew has 5 teenagers and 10 adult leaders. Adult leaders have completed a background check and the Youth Protection Training program that assures safe contact and communication between youth and adults.




The primary volunteer component of the Crew has been to run the **Wooster Bike Compost** program. With an initial donation of 10\$, each participating household gets two 5-gallon buckets with a logo. (Hello Inez and Jim!) In rotation, once a bucket is full, Crew members pick up & return it for 5\$. Our composting site is at the Muellner Park (corner of Oakhill and West Wayne Ave.). A half cubic foot bag of cured compost mixed with potting soil will be available for 20\$/5-gallon bucket. Money raised helps Crew members maintain biking gear and plan/undertake bicycle trips.

A secondary service program of the Crew is the Wooster Bike Recycle program. Community members

donate used bicycles and the Crew repairs and upgrades them with bike-rack and kickstand. The bicycles are then available for purchase to the public for \$150. Crew members may use the bikes for free, but they are responsible for maintaining them. (We are currently seeking adult volunteers (ex. retirees) who might be interested in helping with bicycle repair & repair training).

In addition to an anonymous UUFWC donation through the Wayne County Community Foundation of \$2,500, we have received many bike donations from other members of the UUFWC! Your generosity is much appreciated. Thank you for your support!





Lastly, we organize the **Wooster Bike Party** on the 2nd Sunday of every month, meeting at 3pm at the **Wooster Bike Space** (751 West Wayne), and leaving for a different ride each time, at 3:30pm. Some of us in the **Wooster Bike Crew** accompany the guest riders (usually from Wooster, Akron or Canton), in case there are mechanical or tire issues along the route. We hope that some of you will join us at one time or another. We will adapt the bike ride to who is riding with us. It does not have to be a difficult ride.


