# Minister's Meditations Rev. Walter Clark

I love Christmas movies. I blame my mother for this. She always had a movie playing in the background and this time of year there was a heavy rotation of White Christmas, Miracle on 34 th Street, Scrooge (with Albert Finney), all the Rankin and Bass claymation movies (Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer, Santa Claus is Comin' to Town, The Year Without a Santa Claus) and on occasion National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation.

I consider myself to be a bit of a Christmas movie expert, if such a thing exists. I often find myself arguing with others of my generation as to whether or not Die Hard is a Christmas movie (it is not) as well as The Nightmare Before Christmas (it is). For me it always comes down to the story being told. What is the movie trying to tell us about the holiday season? How does it leave us feeling afterwards? Is it in the spirit of Christmas?

Recently I re-watched Miracle on 34th Street (the 1947 black and white version with Maureen O'Hara, John Payne and Natalie Wood). It was as cute as I remembered it and the courtroom scene at the end was as amusing and uplifting as ever. However, what surprised me was the insistence of the spirit of the season. Kris Kringle is angered at the commercialization of the holiday and how folks are forgetting the wonder and joy of the season. Fred Gailey (the lawyer) is working to help Doris Walker (the Macy's manager) rediscover her sense of wonder, mystery, and play. The story is not so much about convincing a judge that a nice old man is the actual Santa Claus. The story is about maintaining a sense of wonder and mystery in a world that insists on facts as the only way of being in the world.

To me, what makes a Christmas movie is a sense of wonder and the fantastical. The idea that goodness is often in the smallest and most unlikely of places. That the hope to save all of humanity rests in the life of a small child born of the most modest means. That light persists even when are oil should only last for a few days. That the most miserly of men can turn his life around overnight. This is the time of year where we find hope in places that logically don't make sense.

However you celebrate the winter holidays, I hope you remember the lessons that the stories of this time of year tell us. That there is hope in mystery, that beauty exists in the humblest of places, and that joy is always an option.



NARRATIVE AND GRIEF: AUTOETHNOGRAPHIES OF LOSS Edited by Deleasa Randall-Griffiths and Patricia English-Schneider 155.937 Rand 2023

Thank you to Deleasa Randall-Griffiths, a member of our congregation, who donated this new title to our UUFWC library. A professor in the Department of Communication Studies at Ashland University, Deleasa is an editor of this volume as well as author of one of its chapters.

The quotation below is from the book's back cover:

"Grief and loss are fundamental aspects of the human experience. Narrative and Grief examines the desire to make sense out of the nonsensical by exploring specific stories of loss and grief, including the loss of a parent, a child, or partner; loss within larger family systems; ambiguous and anticipatory loss; and broader cultural aspects of grief. The autoethnographic essays in this book reflect on the unique and individual experiences of each contributor's story. Simultaneously, these essays reveal that although each grief experience is unique, it is also collective, evoking broader cultural themes related to loss and grief. Scholars of communication, sociology, and family studies will find this book of particular interest."

ALTERNATIVE GIFT MARKET is coming to Wooster on Sunday, December 3 at First Presbyterian Church in Wooster from 11:30 am to 2 pm. This is an annual opportunity to purchase shares of financial gifts that provide hunger relief, quality education, environmental protection, empowerment of women and health and well-being in the U.S. and internationally. Visit the displays of the projects offered and make your selections. The purchase of a \$5 share of a gift provides a description of it and a greeting card in which to enclose it. According to the parent organization, Alternative Gifts International, these are gifts "that are sustainable and that build stability for people and their communities to help end their suffering. These alternative gifts multiply and grow and offer hope and new life to people and communities facing grave crisis and need. These gifts challenge the trivia of our modern culture of consumerism. These are authentic gifts that will change lives. They are always the perfect gift for any occasion." While at the Gift Market, you can also purchase Fair Trade items and have lunch.

**SALVATION ARMY SERVICES:** we've just rang the bell for the Salvation Army. Often our thoughts turn to its shelter, but are you aware of the many social services this organization provides to our community to help people through tough times? For the homeless there are a number of services in addition to the shelter which provides beds for men, women and some families. Started in 2020, the Living Room, a day center, opened to provide a place to go for those struggling with homelessness. Open from 10 am to 3 pm, it provides a place for people to go during the day. The center features a sitting area, phone charging stations, computer access, a warm meal and shower and laundry facilities. It acts as a hub to give clients access to community resources such as social services, transportation serves and mental health and substance abuse counseling. At this time the Salvation Army also provides space for the Severe Weather Shelter, operated by Homeward Bound of Wooster and Wayne County. This service provides beds and a meal for the homeless from December 1 to

March 31. Among its other activities are disaster services, emergency financial assistance, food and nutrition programs, emergency shelter, casework services, visitation services, camping activities, senior citizens clubs, day camp activities along with a variety of religious ministries for women, men and youth

### All Things Green Submitted by Betty Schuler

The BIG WIRES Act: On 9/18/23 Senator John Hickenlooper (D) and Representative Scott Peters (R) introduced the **Building Integrated Grids With Interregional Energy Supply Act (BIG WIRES Act**) to update and streamline the country's energy transmission system. The U.S. electricity system is a patchwork of undersized and aging lines. Few transmission routes reach the nation's best solar and wind resources, and most are unable to move bulk power between the various regional grids. This transmission shortfall is contributing to grid outages across the country and inflating energy prices for American families and businesses. Since 2014 North America has built just 7 gigawatts of large-scale interregional transmission compared to 44 gigawatts in Europe and 260 gigawatts in China during the same period.

More and more states have passed renewable energy laws and net zero goals, ultimately resulting in more renewable energy development. However these projects rely on transmission build-outs without which the aggressive transition to clean energy cannot be implemented. Decarbonizing the U.S. by 2050 will require at least tripling its capacity. According to researchers at Princeton University's ZERO lab, nearly half the emissions reductions promised by the Inflation Reduction Act between now and 2030 could be sacrificed if transmission upgrades continue at their current pace. The Department of Energy projects that the U.S. grid must incorporate over 2.5 terawatts of wind, solar, battery and other clean energy tech within the next several decades.

The BIG WIRES Act requires regions to be able to transfer 30% of their peak demand between regions. Such energy sharing would reduce the need to build new energy infrastructure. Interregional transmission would make the grid more efficient, in the same way that interstate highways make our road systems more efficient. The bill is technology neutral: all types of generation – fossil, renewable and nuclear need transmission to connect to the grid.

This bill would cost the U.S. government no money. The regions are responsible for deciding who builds and pays for new transmission lines. Its benefits include: 1. improved reliability – a new minimum-transfer requirement would increase reliability by allowing for greater power flows between regions, adding a layer of defense against extreme weather events; 2. reduced costs – the expanded transfer capabilities would dramatically lower energy prices for Americans; 3. tech-neutrality- all types of generation need transmission to connect to the grid.

According to the National Audubon Society, 'The BIG WIRES Act would help pave the way for the rapid decarbonization of the electrical grid while reducing impact on wildlife habitats and ensuring a high level of reliability and resilience for consumers and businesses across the country."
