### **Minister's Meditations**

Are you ready to Love into the new year?

I came across a quote today that got me thinking about the difficulty of Love. Most of us think of Love as something that we are all capable of, that we all want in our lives, and it is the motivation that is at the center of our faith. All of these things are true and yet, Love can be a real challenge. The quote that got me thinking was this:

Love isn't something natural. Rather it requires discipline, concentration, patience, faith, and the overcoming of narcissism. It isn't a feeling, it is a practice. – <u>Eric Fromm</u>

Fromm speaks of the challenges to love when pitted against our baser instincts of selfishness, comfort and convenience. It is easy to love when no one asks anything of you but when you are asked to go outside of your comfort zone, make a sacrifice or otherwise put yourself aside, it can be a lot more challenging to Love.

A great example of this is being a dog owner. If you own a dog, you know that it requires a ton of work. They need to be walked for their physical and mental health and they often need to be walked at the most inconvenient times: rainstorms, snowstorms, while you are sick, or right when your book is getting good. They can demand attention when you least expect it and are very difficult to ignore. They can really put a crimp in your lifestyle. And yet, most folks who own dogs treat them better than most humans. They love their fur babies so much that they do all of these things with no (or little) grumbling. Their love is a practice.

What if we were to love the stranger as much as a dog owner loves their dog? What if we lived the practice of love in all of our interactions? What if we were better at putting aside our small comforts and selfishness so that others could thrive? Ask any dog owner, they'll tell you it's worth it.

The COM appreciates your support. We look forward to the next phases of Reverend Walter's journey to full fellowship.

**January 14** - Welcome to Lake Sunday! Lake Sunday is about coming back from our journey - back down the mountain - and reflecting on our trip to First Presbyterian and what we have learned about Christianity.

There's so much in this rich tradition of Islam to explore, but one theme in particular stuck out: Islam's focus on battling pride and self-centeredness. So many of Islam's core practices are built with the aim of helping one place God and others at the center of one's attention rather than oneself. While this radical "other-centeredness" may at first seem very different from our UU faith, it's actually very similar to our UU focus on interdependence. Muslims say God deserves center stage. UUs say the interdependent web deserves that sacred spot. But both agree that we've got to get the self and selfishness out of the spotlight.

We will also explore the many contributions of Islam to Western Civilization during what's called its Golden Age in the 8th - 14th centuries. Muslims introduced hospitals, universities, surgery, optics and more to Europe. Islam and its gifts were a major force that helped Europe out of the Dark Ages. While it's not as well-known as it should be, Islam kickstarted the Renaissance! This awareness of the Golden Age powerfully challenges the inaccurate, negative and harmful stereotypes about Islam as a force "out to destroy culture."



On December 14, the UUFWC SAC met in person for the first time since the pandemic began. Thanks to all who came – we had eleven folks! The first thing we did was set a monthly meeting time and decided on the second Thursday of the month at 7 PM. We would love to see everyone at our next meeting at 7PM on January 11. We reviewed the impressive list of previous and current committee activities. Highlights of some continuing activities that you may know include:

- gathering Christmas/holiday gifts for Head Start kids
- the Alternative Gift Market
- road clean-up on rte 3 north of Wooster
- Green Team activities in our building
- People-to-People collections (currently in the NW end of the lobby)
- Fair Trade coffee and chocolate sales.

Current activities that members do with other local groups include:

- the UCC's free breakfast and supporting their work with the homeless
- bell ringing at Christmas time
- the NAACP's MLK Birthday celebration, and the environmental issues, justice and criminal justice committees
- the League of Women Voters (LWV) for voter registration, informing voters on local issues and encouraging people to get to the polls
- Ohio Voice and other organizations for peacekeeping and monitoring at polls Whew! That's a lot of activity.

The group talked more broadly on things that we'd like to focus on in 2024 and we identified several core areas:

## **All Things Green**

<u>HOW TO BE A SMART SALTER</u>: Ohio is the 3rd largest U.S. producer of rock salt (5.4 million metric tons) and the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest consumer of rock salt (3.5 metric tons). Since the 1940's rock salt has become the most effective and affordable way of keeping roads clear of snow and ice. Nationwide every winter an average of 20 million tons of salt are applied to miles of roads, parking lots, sidewalks and driveways.

The use of salt (sodium chloride) has more than doubled over the past four decades, leading to salt-based issues ranging from ecological harm, infrastructure issues, and health concerns for humans and pets. More salt on land and in surface water means more salt in groundwater and drinking water. Salt is not removed by traditional water treatment processes. Saltier drinking water can contribute to health concerns in humans such as increased blood pressure. Saltier drinking water can also lead to infrastructure issues. Sodium chloride is corrosive, so higher salinity in drinking water means metal pipes and pumps corrode more quickly. Salt is also corrosive to vehicles and other property. Salt on roadways can attract deer and other animals who come to lick the salt, which can increase road kill and accidents involving animals. Eating rock salt can also be dangerous for pets. Increased salinity in waterways can be harmful, and even toxic to aquatic insects, plants, fish and amphibians. Salt reduces permeability of soils and causes nutrients and metals to leach out of the soil into the environment. Plants will struggle to grow in salty soils and can be damaged or killed by excess salt.

Though we may not be able to control how much salt is put on the roads, we can control our own salting behaviors on our driveways and sidewalks which can greatly improve the health of our watershed without jeopardizing our safety. FIRST, watch the weather. Rock salt only works at temperatures above 15 degrees F. Products containing calcium chloride can melt ice in temperatures as low as -25 degrees F. Remember that chloride in deicer is what burns your pets' paws and deteriorates concrete. SECOND, use less. One of the biggest and most expensive mistakes homeowners make is over applying. One 12 oz. coffee mug is enough to treat 10 sidewalk squares or a 20 foot driveway. More salt does not mean more melting. Salt is effective spread evenly and not in clumps, with space between the granules. A fertilizer spreader can be helpful when spreading on a driveway. Also, be sure to sweep up remaining undissolved salt once the ice has melted. If it is visible on dry pavement its job is done and it can be reused. THIRD, spread salt only on the surfaces of your driveway and sidewalk that need to be deiced and never on the lawn, at the base of trees, or near a stream or storm drain. FOURTH, salt works best when it is applied right before the snow falls or right after snow is removed from your driveway or sidewalk. Shoveling and removing snow and ice during a snowstorm reduces the amount of salt required. Remember, once you put salt down, it doesn't go away.
